

# **Funding Applications**

I thought it might be of interest to our Members to summarise the current situation with our application to the BIG lottery fund.

After our very successful completion last year of the £85,174 energy saving project which included the new boilers and heating system, thermal render and photovoltaic cells, Council were quietly confident that we would be successful in our £351,201 Stage 2 application to the Big Lottery Fund for the major refurbishment of the Theatre and 30 Wilson Street. A huge amount of time and effort, numerous meetings with potential new users of the Theatre facilities and other groups supporting our activities took place before the bid was submitted.

We were disappointed therefore that instead of the mid-February approval we had hoped for, we received a communication from the Big Lottery Fund seeking further clarification on a number of issues including our consultation with 'hard to reach' groups, the proposed split between arts and non-arts activities and future management structure. On a much more positive note, the Big Lottery Fund has acknowledged that our application has areas of strength, that we have developed excellent working relationships with local delivery organisations and that, subject to our response to the various questions now being asked of us, our project is one that the Big Lottery Fund's funding committee may consider taking through to the third (and final) stage. Through subsequent dialogue with the Big Lottery Fund's grant assessor we have already made significant progress in addressing the various questions that have been raised. We have been given until 30 April to submit the revised bid.

Of course, the Big Lottery Fund's contribution is only part of the funding picture. We have also sought contributions from the Monument Trust (one of the Sainsbury's family trusts), the Theatre's Trust, WREN and various other trust funders. In the meantime, the JP Getty Junior Trust has awarded us £20,000 and the Francis C Scott Charitable Trust £10,000. Both of these grants are conditional on our Lottery Fund application being successful.

#### Stop Press!!

We have just heard that the Sainsbury Monument Trust have awarded us a massive £60,000 to be paid if our lottery bid is successful. They have been so impressed by our theatre and the project that they have offered to write directly to the BIG lottery fund in support of our bid

## 'Only Fools and Horses.'



Something very different for Theatre Royal patrons! John Challis who played Boycie in Only Fools and Horses and The Green Green Grass is going to appear at our theatre on October 29<sup>th</sup>.

During the evening John will recall many amusing anecdotes about *Only Fools*, Sir David Jason and Nicholas Lyndhurst. He will also talk about his time on other TV programmes including *Dr Who*, *Coronation St* and *The Green Grass*. He discusses encounters with the Beatles, The Rolling Stones, Julie Goodyear, Oliver Reed and George Best.

The evening includes, DVD clips including excerpts from *Only Fools* and *Dr Who*. There will be a question and answer session with the audience and a chance to meet the actor after the show.

This is a 'one-off' opportunity and should prove to be a fascinating evening. Tickets will be priced at £15.



February ... saw the Theatre Royal host a meeting of representatives of local groups connected to NODA. This was run in conjunction with Radio Cumbria and 'Up For Arts', a Voluntary Arts England project and was looking at how local groups could maximise the use of local media for publicity.



'Up for Arts' is an exciting project which aims to get people involved in the arts and crafts and increase community engagement. It 'harnesses the power of speech

based radio to raise the profile of volunteering and inspire people to get creative in their area.' The session was led by Liam Fogarty, a freelance journalist and broadcaster who formerly worked for the BBC, Jennie Dennett from Radio Cumbria and a spokesperson from 'Up For Arts'. With support from NODA, 'Up for Arts' has recently produced a free toolkit entitled 'Making the most of your local broadcasters'. The toolkit is freely available on both organisations websites and is an essential guide for local groups who want to raise their profile. I also have a copy – please ask if you would like to borrow it.

Devised by Voluntary Arts and NODA (the National Operatic & Dramatic Association) the 'toolkit' aims to 'help you make the most of your local broadcasters. There are huge opportunities out there, in local television and radio – and this easy-to-read booklet talks you through who to approach, how to communicate your message and much more.'

The meeting had representatives from groups in Maryport, Gosforth, Barrow, Workington and Whitehaven. Liam Fogarty guided us through the toolkit and spoke about how it could be used in conjunction with Radio Cumbria. Thanks to Pat Brinicombe, we already put a number of his ideas into action and it was good to hear our publicity methods endorsed.

Other strategies that were mentioned have been used in the past but would perhaps be worth revisiting in the hope of bringing in new faces. The use of social media was also stressed and this is an area that we will hopefully be developing. Why not visit our website and read about us on Facebook and Twitter?

### Commemorating WW1

Two ventures are being planned.

Gwyneth Savage has obtained the rights to a very moving one man play entitled 'Tommy Atkins'. It is hoped that this will be staged in early September 2014. Written by a relatively local playwright, it tells the story of one soldier and the horrors that he faced during the war. This will not be part of our main season. The number of evenings is still under discussion but it will hopefully be on for three performances. We understand that this will be the first time this play has been performed by anyone other than the author. More details at a later date.

Our second event will hopefully be a joint production with CADS. This will take the form of a revue/commemoration tracing a soldier's war from signing up until the end of the war. It will involve letters, music, poetry, play extracts, novel extracts and factual documents. It is very much in the planning stage at the moment. Actors, directors and technicians from both groups will be involved and it is currently being planned for February 2015. Again, more details as plans develop. # Live Music First!

On the **25<sup>th</sup> of June** the Theatre Royal is going to do another first – a 'live' concert is going to be filmed for a **DVD release**. It's not quite the first time the theatre has been used for DVD filming: a Jazz recording session was filmed in 2010 (you can watch a clip of it on Youtube – search for the '1930s Recording Project'), but that was not a concert and has not been released yet. In June the concert will feature **Greg Russell & Ciaran Algar**. Greg & Ciaran are two hugely popular young folk musicians. Last year they won the **BBC Young Folk Award** and this year they have just won the **Horizon Award** (best newcomers) in the **BBC Radio 2 Folk Awards** which was televised from the **Royal Albert Hall** last February.



They have reached this position in just over two years. I produced their first CD in 2012 and their second should be released by the time of the concert. When I say they are young, they really are: Ciaran was taking his GCSEs and Greg his A levels when we recorded the first album. Ciaran will just have finished his A levels when the concert takes place and Greg is two thirds of the way through a sabbatical year from University. Greg is a very powerful singer and plays guitar,

bouzouki, banjo and concertina; Ciaran is a wonderful fiddle player who also plays guitar,



bouzouki, bodhran and sings <sub>Bodhran</sub> (actually he plays about 10

instruments in all!). They are exciting to watch, and really know how to engage an audience: their stagecraft, like their music, is of a very high standard.

They are also two of the nicest lads you'll ever meet. You can find loads of **Youtube** clips of them (including Ciaran's famous acceptance speech at the **Young Folk Awards** which has been dubbed "best acceptance speech").

Filming will be in the capable hands of **Edward Cooper**, lecturer at the University of Cumbria who already has a reputation for the quality of his work, particularly his DVDs of the band **Bellowhead**. We will have up to six cameras in operation. I chose the **Theatre Royal** obviously because I'm connected with it but also because it has excellent acoustics and looks good. I will also be using some of the young people I have trained to look after the P.A. sound and the film sound recording. Of course, we need a full house for the filming, but, given their national reputation that should not be a problem. So, if you want to be part of it I suggest you book as soon as possible: the **Carnegie Box Office** is now open.

I would also remind you of the annual concert with **Jeff Barnhart**. Jeff always gets a good crowd who have a good time. This year's concert is on **Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> August.**

We have an excellent team on the Props committee and our meetings prior to a play come up with weird and wonderful ideas on how to overcome any problem item. Recently we noticed Martini bottles have changed in shape and style of labelling, shock horror as we have no old ones in store! We're ransacking drinks cupboards at the moment in search of bottles with stage potential.



Newspapers have been crucial in several productions, and that can be anything from a Victorian issue through to present day. T'internet

has been a godsend in reproducing a lot of paper props but if any of you out there have a stash of ancient newspapers do let us know, we might be happy to borrow one from time to time.

If I have inspired any Prompter reader to find out more about back- stage work and joining the team of prop-hunters I'll be delighted to hear from you.
