A Heritage Funded WW1Commemoration Drama set in West Cumbria

April 10th and 11th – Dean School April 21st – 25th – Theatre Royal

Written and Directed by Beryl Ballance Produced by Workington Playgoers

Tickets for both venues are **free**.

Written and directed by Beryl Ballance and performed by Playgoers, CADS and other local actors, this moving play uses fictional characters but real life events to depict life both at home and in the trenches.

Beryl Ballance writes, "'Tommy's Story' doesn't just portray the agony of the lads at the front, it gives testimony to the power of community spirit - communities that could easily have been torn apart by the ravages of WW1 but were conquered by friendship, loyalty and love, communities that overcome the most horrific times imaginable.

Mothers of five British soldiers await their sons' fate; sons who have been dazzled by the whole concept of going off to war, fighting for their country and coming back heroes. The soldiers go, thinking it is all a massive game..."

On the social front I would like to thank Jenni Rushton who organised a very successful Members' evening in a Cockermouth restaurant in early March. 25 Members enjoyed a buffet supper and read extracts from Up Pompeii, 1984 and Cleo, Camping etc by Terry We hope to organise another Members' evening shortly to discuss plans for the year and any other burning issues. Ron Dickens may be moving house, so we will possibly have to find an alternative venue for the Summer barbecue.



The development of a youth theatre group (*Second Stars*) in the Theatre Royal organised and run by Millie Hardie Sims and her mother Maria is very

exciting and hopefully should introduce Playgoer members of the future to the Theatre. All of the youngsters taking part are joining Playgoers as Junior Members and we have enlisted James Watson's help once again to source some grant funding to support the junior productions. They too will decamp to Moorclose while the building work is carried out.

And finally, I must thank Gwyneth and Nicola most sincerely once again on behalf of all our Members for the magnificent sum of £662-

60 raised for the Theatre Royal from their 309 mile walk from Chepstow to Land's End last year. They raised a similar amount for the Henderson Suite at Whitehaven hospital and will be off again this year from Carlisle to Grangemouth. Please support them! Peter Inglis

Props

Since joining CADS in 1986, I have played numerous parts, from Alice in 'Hobson's Choice' to the title role in 'Educating Rita' and Sarah in 'Accrington Pals' to name but a few.

I always had a yearning to direct, but never had the confidence. In 2009 I eventually plucked up the courage and directed John Godber's 'April in Paris'; a play that we were awarded Runner up for in the NODA Drama Festival.

About eighteen months ago I decided I wanted to direct something about WW1. I spoke to the Chair of Playgoers who, along with me, thought it would be a good idea for both of our societies to join forces for this special commemoration production.

I made up the story and characters then wrote the script for 'Tommy's Story,' which was something I thoroughly enjoyed, nearly as much as I have enjoyed directing the play. The characters are fictitious; although I have used Cumbrian names, they have no bearing on anyone living or dead. Some incidents really did happen and ... they are included due to the help I received from my Stage Manager Jackie Burd. Jackie did most of the research for the play. I have tried as much as possible for the drama to be authentic however, please allow me some artistic licence, as I am not an historian

Jackie also put in a successful bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund. We were very lucky; we were given nearly £10,000 for the project. I would like to take this occasion to thank her for her hard work in that department.

Living with 'Tommy'.

The idea for this joint Playgoers/CADS production was first mooted in 2013. The idea had been sparked by a Playgoers Council meeting where we wondered how to commemorate WW1. The notion of a revue was raised and this, coupled with an earlier idea of a joint production with CADS, resulted in an initial foray one cold winter's night to Cockermouth Conservative Club where

several Playgoers and CADS members discussed the project with enthusiasm. That was the start of a roller coaster experience and ... I was there!



The revue then began to evolve. In order to incorporate the myriad of material that we wanted to include, the 'thing' needed a structure. A mere revue seemed far too jolly for the events we wished to commemorate and so ... Beryl started writing!

It was wonderful watching the script take shape. At times it almost seemed to have a life of its own. A joint planning group met regularly throughout 2014. The consistency of the group was somewhat fluid at times but a faithful group of stalwarts remained true to the cause. Beryl kept us up to date with her writing and slowly a very moving and engaging story began to emerge. Scene read-throughs were emotional events as Beryl transformed thoughts and ideas into realistic dialogue. Together we researched appropriate poetry and Jackie Burd, Stage Manager for the production, researched many local and national events which were incorporated into the script.

At an early stage Beryl brought Mike Ames, a renowned local musician and musical director, on board as our Musical Director and his enthusiasm and expertise were – and are – inspirational. He is a perfectionist with an eye for detail and an insight into what will captivate an audience. He enlisted the skills of a number of brass musicians and also the help of dance teacher Gill Greenhalgh, (Strictly Kirkgate) to help choreograph the Music Hall section and together they make a formidable team.

As the script and cast numbers grew, so did the costs, particularly for costumes and musicians, and it was soon realised that this was going to be an expensive production. Financial help was needed. Jackie, Beryl and Peter applied for Lottery funding and after many tense weeks and some negotiations, we were successful ... with the added bonus of extra funding so that we need not charge for tickets. One of the conditions for the money was that we did some outreach work, hence the performances at Dean School. This all means extra work for the production team but hopefully it also means we will reach a wider audience – even if Dean is only a few miles away!

Acquiring actors for the various parts was a nightmare at times. Some recognised the calibre of the script from an early stage but finding our young soldiers was a headache. However a



combination of the power of the press and word of mouth has resulted in the discovery of some very promising talent. (Let's hope they will volunteer for other productions now they have the bug!)

Now we are almost there. The Playgoers production team have created some wonderful costumes, some excellent props and an imaginative set. Beryl Ballance's script is funny, sad and dramatic. The cast has actors both familiar to you and new. The music will 'blow you away'. Catch this Playgoers/CADS production from April 21st – 25th. Your last chance to see The Playgoers in action in The Theatre Royal this year! (Watch out for news of our productions at Moorclose later in the year).

Play Production

From a play point of view this season has been full of false starts and missed deadlines as it has taken so long in getting confirmation of what was happening with the lottery funding and when work would start or not if we failed to get the funding. This has affected what plays could be chosen, when they would/could go on as before anything starts on the refurbishment, the theatre needs to be cleared of props, costumes, play scripts, stage gear etc. and this is going to take a fair amount of time to do. This impacts on the

plays as we can't be building sets when at the same time we are trying to clear the theatre.



We are now at the stage where "Tommy's Story" will be on in April but after that no plays will be performed in the theatre until the building work has been completed which is likely to be early next year. This has not stopped us though in trying to continue the work of the club.



We are going to be putting on "Bouncers" in July, "Twelfth Night" in October and "Dad's Army" in December. They will be going on in the Moorclose Sixth Form building. We will need your support for these performances and to spread

the word that we are not closed for business.

Next year should be an exciting time as we want to start with a bang and we have been successful in getting one of the first amateur opportunities to perform a "murder" play. This play has had a successful run in London and has been on tour throughout the UK. Thanks to Jenni Rushton for getting us this opportunity. Don't want to jeopardise our opportunity until things are finalised so won't mention the play's title. This

will be followed by ?????. We have ideas and plays in mind but they need to be confirmed by Council before we can let you know what they will be. Suffice to say that we are

thrilled by some of the suggestions made. But now we would like to give you an opportunity to influence the choice so please let me know of any ideas that you may have. Exciting times are ahead so let's make the most of the new vibrant theatre with plays that you want to see.

Soundwave is one of the leading music participatory companies in the North of England.

Established since 2007, Soundwave is a company limited by guarantee, and since March 2014 a registered charity.



Soundwave is funded by the National Foundation for Youth Music and receives project and

strategic funding from the Arts Council of England, as well as various trusts and foundations. We earn income by charging for workshops, some projects and events.

We are leading a music education revolution! Our goal is to create fresh and exciting opportunities for people (young people especially) to use music and singing to connect with and inspire each other.

We're on a mission track down every rural location, freethinking school, digital platform, community venue, bedroom studio and open air



square footage to use music and singing to improve people's playing, singing voice, health, relationships, work opportunities, lifestyle choices and the quality and range of fun activities they can undertake in their spare time.

Every year Soundwave engages with more than 3000 people, mainly young people who are in challenging circumstances. Our work focusses on:

- 13-19 year-olds who are not attending regular education, training or employment.
