




## **UPDATE FROM THE CHAIRMAN**

# Back by Popular Demand - Jeff Barnhart. August 22<sup>nd</sup>.


Has the Theatre Royal ever has visiting musician who has proved so popular that he has returned to give an annual concert for over ten years? If not then Jeff Barnhart from Mystic, Connecticut, USA, is about to enter Theatre Royal history.

Jeff appeared as a guest at the Keswick Jazz Festival in 1996 and has been returning every year since. He met up with our own Paul Adams whose day job is as a record producer and who has recorded 8 CDs with Jeff - some recorded in the theatre - and also became a member of Paul's band The Lake Records International Jazz Band. The theatre is always trying to get grants and if it is shown to do more than put on its own plays it looks good on application forms. With this in mind Paul decided to try a concert with Jeff and see what happens. What happened was that the audience wanted more, so Jeff has returned every year since 2004!

Jeff is described as a "Jazz musician" which he is and a very talented one - but he is much more than that implies: in simple terms he is an entertainer in every sense of the word. He will dazzle you with his piano playing, he will sing a wide range of songs from Jazz to Broadway, he will have you laughing until your sides ache with his humour. One publication stated that Jeff was "A dazzling exuberant performer - one extraordinary entertainer". That sums it up.

As before he will be accompanied by his wife, Anne (a very gifted flautist), John Hallam (one of the UK's finest clarinetist and saxophonists) and bass player, Roy Cansdale. If you think you don't like jazz, don't worry there's nothing heavy about this show - just pure class from start to finish and you'll walk away with a smile on your face.
