A tale that ends with the hangman's noose

The Thrill of Love comes to Workington's Theatre Royal next week for a five-night run.

Workington Playgoers perform Amanda Whittington's play about Ruth Ellis, the last woman to be hanged in Britain, from next Tuesday to Saturday (October 10 to 14).

A divorcée with two young children to care for – one fathered by a Canadian soldier, the other born during her marriage to dentist George Ellis – Ruth Ellis works in the kind of nightclubs where more than just drink is on offer. Meeting the wealthy, womanising David, a racing driver with whom she becomes obsessed, it is a relationship that ends in murder, outside the Magdala public house in Hampstead.

Why does she plead not guilty but offer no defence? And who is she trying to protect?

At the age of 28, she was tried and executed in the
