# In search of the *LadyKillers*Directed by Morgan Sweeney

The playwright, Graham Lineham, sticks closely to the outline of the William Rose screenplay but what he has come up with is a very different animal from the 1955 movie; and, while it may lack the Ealing touch, it works very well as a slapstick farce.

A criminal gang occupy the upstairs room of a demure old lady's rickety house, and pose as a string quartet to cover a planned King's Cross heist but everything about the character of the villains is exaggerated. The professorial mastermind is palpably unhinged, while his gang now comprises a closet transvestite, a young druggie, a Romanian cutthroat, and a brainnumbed ex-boxer.

What was once macabre comedy has acquired a madcap, Marx brothers quality. At one point the whole gang hides in a tiny cupboard; when asked the reason for their concealment, they reply: "Mrs Wilberforce, we are artists." And we see them giving a concert to the old lady's teatime guests which turns into a wild parody of avant-garde music.

If something is lost in the process, a great deal is gained. The play has a good deal more pace than the movie and incorporates comic wordplay as well as visual, character and situation comedy, as each criminal tries to either murder, or to avoid murdering, the sweet old widow from whom they're renting their house.

Ealing Comedy historians agree that the 1955 movie is a commentary on the state of Britain as a nation at that time. The cluttered old house, standing by the railway yards, symbolised decrepit England in extremis, waiting to collapse. The gang personified the country's feeble, grasping, self-deluded citizens. Mrs Wilberforce embodied the faded grandeur of the industrial revolution and the British Empire that was holding the nation back.



The 2004 movie remake relocates action to the USA and the robbery from post van to casino. Tom Hanks takes on the Alec Guinness role.



In 2011 the Lineham play version came to the Geilgud Theatre staring His DoctorWhoiness, Peter Capaldi. The Daily Mail review said, "there is no mistaking the genuine appeal of this thoroughly jolly and classically produced show."

# **Call for Chaperones!**

A Chaperone (or Matron) is the title of a licensed person appointed to protect, control and care for children whilst they are performing. The law states, "The Chaperone is acting in loco parentis and should exercise the care which a good parent might be reasonably expected to give that child."

Chaperone have responsibilities such as logging certain activities during a performance i.e. arrival & departure times at the place of the performance etc, the chaperones are often asked to monitor and record all the times that the children are working, having a break or having lessons. This documentation is a legal requirement for the children's licensing authority. It can take up to twelve weeks for a chaperone license to come through once the DBS checks have been made and proved successful.
