Breaking news about Second Stars Youth Theatre!

We are coming to the end of the first year since we made changes to the way SSYT was run. It has been a bit of a turbulent year with some set-backs and some very positive things happening. The biggest set-back was the half-term project involving a production of 'The BFG' not being able to go ahead due to us not being able to obtain a licence to do it. It was to be Sophie Mackenzie's debut as a play director which was a shame, but Sophie rallied everyone and they pulled together another Showcase which was very well received.

Another set-back was that the summer project had been set-up a year ago and as the date got closer it became apparent that most of the young actors were not going to be around and so 'Oliver Twist' (not the musical!) has moved to Friday and Saturday 31st August/1st September. It was to be directed by Millie Hardy- Sims, but will not be now. A new director will be appointed very soon. The script will be specially written for the group by Paul Adams, who has written scripts for school groups and for BBC Radio.

Our positives: the first was the production of 'Alice In Wonderland'. This marked Georgia Douglas-Brown's debut as a play director and an excellent job she made of it bringing out some topnotch performances by our young actors. We do have some real talent in the group. The other big positive was our application for funding from Workington Town Council was successful. We have been given £2,500 with an option on further funding for the next two years as well. In order to justify this we need to be able to perform the plays for at least three performances and this means we need your support!



Kate and Henry have taken a holiday let on a small island in the Firth of Lorn. He is a poet, about to complete the second volume of his published works. Meanwhile, Kate has decided to leave him and intends to use the opportunity of a week away to break the bad news. But something is wrong with the wiring in the house. Whenever they use the waste disposal unit, in the kitchen sink, the whole day resets to breakfast and begins again — with renewed hope of a better future. But what does 'a better future' really mean, for each of them? Welcome to Kate and Henry's World, where they cannot both be happy at the same time. Or can they find a way — in a box where a cat can be, simultaneously, alive and dead?

Last of the Quantum Timekeepers!

In June, the Theatre Royal played host to the latest filming associated with the Doctor Who spoof, "Last of the Quantum Timekeepers!" The project is the brainchild of Philip Hewitson who will be well known to anyone involved in film-making in Cumbria. LOTQTK is a labour of love for Philip and he's been filming across the length and breadth of Cumbria as he's built a parallel universe of fictitious storylines and history of a science

fiction show that never existed! This time, film group members, Ben Brinicombe, Sarah Delorme, Phil Gable and Pippa Cahill helped out both in front of and behind the camera.
